OK, throw one of John's Snoopy dogs into the mix, for good measure.


I recently asked Jeff how this came to be, and he said it all started with the 2004 air show that his dad brought him to when Jeff was 18. They were curious about how such a great

and the Massachusetts Military History Expo

From May 17th to the 19th "Whiskey 7" went to Orange, MA, for the Massachusetts Military History Expo at the Orange Municipal Airport.





This is one of the largest gatherings of military vehicles and equipment in New England. It also hosts reenactors from the Revolutionary War

through WW II. There was a Media Flight on Friday, shortly after arrival. Whiskey 7 sold rides on Saturday and had two parachute drop flights. Sunday started in rain and there were a few flights in between thunderstorms. There were a lot of walkups and the store reportedly did well. There was lots of interest and people always seemed to appreciate that we were there.

One of the more heartwarming experiences of the trip was being able to take Earl Cooley (a 94 year old former C-47 Crew Chief) for a ride on Saturday morning. He and his family were very happy to experience Whiskey 7 and the team.

So all in all, it was a good trip!!

The C-130A, "Saigon Lady" Project

"Saigon Lady", a C-130A serial number 57-0460, is one of the last planes to leave Saigon at the end of the Vietnam War. The Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum transferred ownership of this plane to the National Warplane Museum on April 27, 2017. Bob Doyle, Don Wilson, and Ray



Ingram, along with a host of others have been working to get it moved to Geneseo from the Smithsonian's storage and restoration facility at Dulles International Airport. Attempts to get the Governor's office to let the Air National Guard unit in Scotia temporarily return it to flyable condition fell short. Other attempts to ferry it to Geneseo also didn't pan out. This left the Museum



with only one option. Disassemble it, truck it here, and reassemble it.

Don and Ray have been working diligently to prep it for transit. Fuel had to be off loaded and properly disposed of. Small parts were detached and trailered to Geneseo by Ray. The bulk of the heavy work has been undertaken by Worldwide Aircraft Recovery, Ltd., out of Omaha, Nebraska. (It should be noted that they lost their shop and suffered damage to their homes in the flooding out

in the Midwest the past few months!) Over the past few weeks, parts of our "new" C-130 have been making their way to Geneseo . This has been a tedious process, requiring the disassembly of the aircraft at Dulles, then using special permits for oversized loads, taking a circuitous route to Geneseo. Parts are then offloaded and stored around the circle at the museum. All that remains at Dulles is the fuselage, and that should be in Geneseo by the time you read this.

The National Warplane Museum plans to display it and tell the story of the pilot, Pham Quang Kheim (see separate story), that evacuated his family to Singapore. We want it to become a monument and pay homage to our veterans of the Vietnam War. We hope to display it in both U.S. and South Vietnamese color schemes. Our fund raising target is



\$250,000. We plan to target major sponsors, government grants, corporate grants, membership donations and general donations. (See article elsewhere in the newsletter about our raffle idea.)





You Never Know What You Might See at the National Warplane Museum



On June 12th, Don Drake and Dennis Bukowski visited from Akron (NY) in Don's DeHavilland Tiger Moth. They were coming to see the replica of the Fokker D.VII that will be on display in the Big Hangar (Story in a future newsletter.)

Built in 1943, this Tiger Moth was used by the RAF to teach glider pilots. It remained with the RAF until 1954, when it was purchased and taken to Ireland, where it

remained until 1970 or so. Then it came to the US and was in Arizona until about 1976. At that time a man by the name of Tom Sumner bought it and took it to Seattle. It remained there for almost 40 years.

out to Seattle and flew it back. This took almost two and a half months to accomplish. They had to wait for good weather, but when they flew the weather was great. They figured a range of about 150 miles. Out in the mountains the airports aren't that close together.

You needed a good reserve. And after about 2 hours you wanted to get out. The open cockpit just beats you up.

Dennis said it ran flawlessly, not a single squawk the whole trip! Not even a fouled spark plug. It was perfect. "It's still perfect. We haven't done a thing to it.", he said.

"The Movie Memphis Belle" (MMB) visited the Chautauqua County Airport in Jamestown, NY, Friday June 21st to Sunday, June 23rd. This was an experiment to test the waters of short visits to local markets. The plan was to book rides, open up the MMB for tours, and set up our Museum store. The decision to attempt this was to see what the market might be. (Thom Richard's P-40 "American Dream" was also there with us. Lou Horschel and his TP-51 "Mad Max" visited from Dunkirk, NY, both days.)





The weekend was an unqualified success. A short flight out over Lake Chautauqua and the City of Jamestown was made to announce our arrival on Friday and generate some interest. The airport FBO had already generated some publicity beforehand. And a front page story in the local Sunday paper added to the interest, The weather for both days would be near perfect. The people came and kept on coming. There were long lines of people waiting to tour the MMB (and they were generous with their donations!).

We were able to fill three full rides on the MMB (2 on Saturday, 1 on Sunday). Our store sold

out of some items, so we were forced to send Don and Amy back to Geneseo to resupply on Saturday. Then we almost sold out again on Sunday! We returned with many empty bins! All in all, it was a VERY successful trip!

"Whiskey 7" and "The Movie Memphis Belle" Help Commemorate the 75 Anniversary of D-Day At the National D-Day Memorial, Bedford, VA

Whiskey 7, unable to repeat the trip to Normandy she had made for the 70th anniversary

of D-Day, travelled to the National D-Day Memorial in Bedford, VA, to commemorate the 75 anniversary of that historic event. Being a D-Day veteran herself (lead plane, second wave), it was important to be a part of this important remembrance.

"Whiskey 7" (W7) travelled to Lynchburg, VA, where she would be based for this event. There she met up with "The Movie Memphis Belle" (MMB) which had made the trip the day before due to concerns about the weather. Also there as part of the flyover festivities, were Stearmans, T-6's, a P-51, a Corsair, and a B-25J

Mitchell bomber, along with a German Focke Wulf 190.

The Commemorative flyover started with the trainers (T-6's and Stearmans), followed by the fighters,

and then the "heavies" (W7, B-25J, and MMB). Each group circled the Memorial, then proceeded to a waiting position, before returning a second time. Modern day fighters and transports also took part. When we returned to the Lynchburg Regional Airport, we proceeded to set up to give rides. Because of regulations, only those persons booked on rides were allowed inside the fence. So, tours were not possible. Our tables and store were set up outside the fence.

Up until this point, the weather had been cooperative. But Friday's forecast was bleak, with weather worsening through the weekend. MMB had two rides filled, then had to leave for Geneseo due to VFR (visual flight rules) restrictions. W7, able to fly IFR (instrument flight rules), would stay the night and leave in the morning. This allowed us to give rides to 97 persons, between 3 and 6 PM. Tina Gillmeister worked



the crowds, filling seats,

and making sure the proper paperwork was done! We "hot loaded" each group, to get in as many rides as possible!

Even weather shortened, the trip can be considered a success! Our D-Day veteran, "Whiskey 7", honored the 75th anniversary of its historic flight. We were able to complete our commitment to the organizer. Plus we were able to sell rides and store merchandise. The people appreciated us being there and many said we received some of the biggest ovations from the crowds during our flyovers.

AT MIDNIGHT THEY COME ALIVE, AND I DANCE WITH THEM



Many of our visitors ask the same question when they see the children's uniforms on display in our America At Home area; 'Why are there kid's uniforms?' The answer is because little ones, during the war, wanted to dress up like the big brother, sister, mommy or daddy in the service. I call that display the 'Women's and Children's Department', much like old style department stores named various areas in stores.

Featured are little boy army uniforms, little girl army, and navy uniforms, as well as grown up nurse, CAP (Civil Air Patrol), USMC, WAC, and Red Cross female uniforms. Also, in that area we feature some dresses and hats, along with picnic baskets, toys, and other items common to that era in America.

While doing tours I enjoy dialing the old rotary phone to let youngsters hear the sound, and then ask them what it is. Most have no idea, and some will poke at the numbers, rather than turn the dial. Many older visitors mention 'party lines' of old. I had one at my first house. Every one's grandmother had one of those metal kitchen tables, and porcelain sinks, as well.



Rarely a week goes by that someone, of certain ages, mentions having fingers caught

in the ringer of the old washing machines. Few know what the Mangle is, that large machine that ironed sheets, table cloths, pillow cases, or any large items. Some ask what 'ironing' means. All common laundry day tools of the 40's and 50's.

Then there is the milk box, clearly labeled as such, but again, another opportunity for a quiz of younger visitors. Yes, they can read what it says, but few know what it was for. A milk man, home delivery,

reused bottles, mothers home all day? All quite strange concepts for our young visitors. No, I don't tell the innocent children any milk man jokes, but I sure have a few dillies!

Equally mesmerizing to youngsters (up to 40+ years old) are the wooden clothes pins with

laundry on the line, wooden croquet set, floor radios the size of a furnace, and a furnace the size of a refrigerator. Add to the list the 'ice box' refrigerator with the condenser on the top, where the ice box used to be. Yes, ice box, and that is what we called it when I was a kid, back before there were trees. The top had a copper bin for the ice. Some were retrofitted with the condenser on top, with the cooling unit inside where the copper box used to be. The ice tongs also get quizzical looks, and they do look a bit scary to youngsters.

So, what about all those ladies standing motionless behind the glass? Well, what I tell visitors is that at midnight they all come alive, and I dance the night away with them. Just Steele being goofy again? You're not really sure, are you?


